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Honoring Devotion

Order Presents Legacy of Servant Leadership to Outstanding Member

Dabney Kennedy has spent six decades committed to Scouting and its ideals; last night the Order of the Arrow presented him with the third Legacy of Servant Leadership Lifetime Achievement Award.

During his impressive career as an adult in the Order, Kennedy spent 22 years as a Section Adviser, 20 years as a Lodge Adviser, and 36 years on the National OA Committee in numerous capacities.

In addition, he served the Order as the Program Chairman for more than 10 National OA Conferences, where he was responsible for coordinating NOAC. Kennedy is currently a member of the Founder's Advisory Council of the National OA Committee.

He was involved in Scouting and the Order as a youth, serving as Lodge Secretary, two terms as Lodge Chief, and at the age of 18 he was appointed to be the Junior Lodge Adviser for his lodge.

He is an Eagle Scout with palms and a recipient of the Silver Explorer Award, Silver Beaver, Silver Antelope, and OA Distinguished Service Award. Since 1958, Kennedy has participated in and played an instrumental part in the production of more than 30 national events for the Order.

These accomplishments, while impressive in and of themselves, cannot begin to describe the positive influence and mark he has left on this Order. Kennedy was inducted into the very small Otena Lodge in 1950.

The lodge was so young that there were no Brotherhood members in it at that point. In 1952, Kennedy became Otena's first Brotherhood member and was bestowed this honor by Karankwa Lodge.

In 1954 he became the lodge's first Vigil Honor member and received the name "Akikta," which is interpreted as "one who works with determination."

At a time when lodges only had lodge patches, Kennedy was one of the first people to design a lodge flap for his lodge.

Kennedy also had an effect on the Order as a whole by designing and creating the Founder's Award.

As a visionary of his time, he realized the need to have a national event every summer and the importance of electing new national youth officers for one-year terms instead of two-year terms.

In 1964, Kennedy graduated from the University of Texas' School of Pharmacy and has had a very successful career as a pharmacist.

Most notably, he spent 30 years working for the Dow Chemical Company as a Regional Sales Manager, National Sales Trainer, and National Safety

Manager.

He married his wife Peggy Jean in 1960 and has two sons that are both Eagle Scouts and Brotherhood members of the Order of the Arrow.

When asked about his strong and ever present passion for the Order of the Arrow, he responded that the most rewarding part of continued service was being able to watch young boys grow and develop into strong, mature leaders in the Order.

He went on to say that NOAC is important and unique, because the standard is set by the youth leadership. NOAC allows young leaders to breathe new life and ideas into the Order and gives them a chance to nurture their strengths and become the leaders of tomorrow.

Dabney Kennedy is truly an inspiration to our organization and the Order is fortunate to have such a devoted volunteer among us who seeks the higher vision.

Going One-on-One with the Chief

Roy Williams serves as the Chief Executive Officer of the National Council, Boy Scouts of America, and has served in this role since June of 2000.

Before being named Chief Scout Executive, he was the Regional Director of the Western Region, Boy Scouts of America.

Mr. Williams was a Scout in Dallas, Texas. He is a veteran of the U. S. Air Force and a graduate of the University of Texas-Arlington.

He began his career in the Longhorn Council, Fort Worth, Texas, in 1972. From there he moved to Abilene, TX, as a District Executive. In 1978 he move to Little Rock, Ark., and served as Finance Director. He was named Scout Executive of the Jayhawk Area Council in Topeka, Kan., in August 1981.

Following five successful years there, he was named Director of the

Boy Scout Division and successfully completed those responsibilities, which included the rewriting of the Boy Scout Handbook.

In 1993, Roy Williams was chosen to be the Director of the Western Region headquartered in Sunnyvale, Calif. Mr. Williams is a recipient of the Vigil Honor and the Order of the Arrow's Distinguished Service Award.

The Daily Legend: What are some of the big issues facing the Boy Scouts?

Roy Williams: One big issue is man/woman power. Attracting hard workers to fill positions within councils and in national areas is one of the biggest issues that are being/need to be addressed. People who are good for these positions are "those people that are willing to care for other peoples children."

DL: What are the plans for new High Adventure bases or camps?

RW: If a council has a camp that is capable of handling high adventure, the

camp could be considered for a High Adventure base. One goal is to minimize the competition between councils for these types of camps. Current High Adventure bases can be built up so that they can better serve the scouting community.

DL: What do you enjoy doing in your free time?

RW: I enjoy playing golf, hunting, fishing, and spending time in the outdoors. However, the activity I enjoy doing the most is scouting. Although it is my job, I would do it for free. I enjoy meeting new people and encouraging scouts to continue along their adventures.

DL: Where do you see the OA and scouting in the next 50 to 100 years?

RW: I see the scouting program including the OA evolving as it has in the past. There won't be any radical changes, but the program will slowly change as it has for the past 50 to 100 years. It will constantly change as times change but it

and achievements in the form of presentations and formal annual reports to their Council Executive Boards.

A new addition to this year's program is a break-out meeting that allows participants to give direct feedback on what they see going right and talk about areas that could potentially be improved concerning several National OA programs.

High Adventure, National Bulletin, LLD, On-line Trading Post, and the National Web site are just some of the committees looking for your suggestions, so come prepared with comments!

After an award presentation for the National OA Service Grant recipients, the 2006 National Council of Chiefs will conclude with a special guest speaker who will undoubtedly leave everyone with feelings of inspiration and cause.

If you are a lodge chief or adviser, this is an exciting opportunity that you cannot afford to miss on Tuesday!

The event will be held in The Big 10 A-C Rooms in the Kellogg Center.

National Recognition Awards

In 1940, the Distinguished Service Award was created to honor those who render service to the Order beyond the lodge level. The award is presented to those Arrowmen who have rendered distinguished and outstanding service to the Order on a sectional, area, regional, or national basis. It is given primarily for dedicated service to the Order and Scouting over a period of years.

The first awards were presented at Camp Twin Echo, Pennsylvania, to Dr. E. Urner Goodman, Col. Carroll A. Edson and eight others at the 1940 National Meeting. Between 1940 and the first National Conference in 1948, the award was presented

at National Meetings as deserving individuals were found. Thereafter, the award presentation became a traditional part of the pageantry and ceremony of the National Conference. Since the time of the first awards in 1940, fewer than 800 Distinguished Service Awards have been presented. This alone is a testament to its high standard of excellence. The award is a sterling silver arrowhead, bearing an arrow pointing upward and to the wearer's right, suspended from a white neck ribbon upon which are embroidered red arrows. A white square knot embroidered upon red cloth also is available for uniform wear.

Presentation of the award is limited. Arrowmen

whose service records are the most outstanding and extend farthest beyond others in the local lodge are usually selected. Nominations are open to both youth and adult Arrowmen.

Another National Recognition is the Red Arrow Award — presented by the National Order of the Arrow Committee for distinguished service to the Order by either non-Scouters or Scouters who are not members of the Order. This service may take many forms and should involve a significant period of time, as opposed to single event. A limited number of awards are presented to those whose accomplishments are of the highest order.

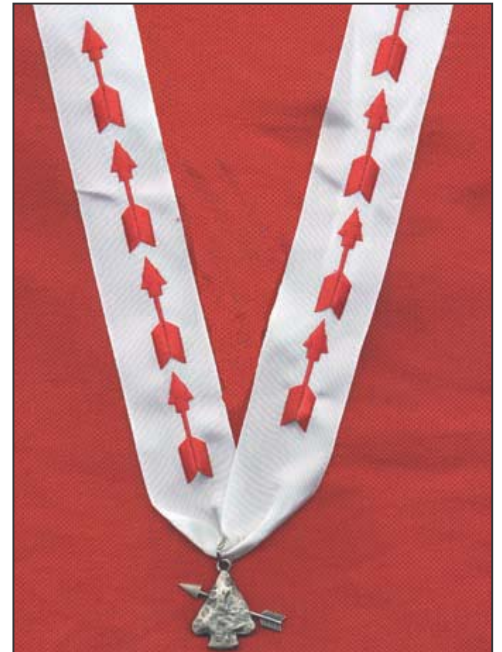
2006 Red Arrow Recipient

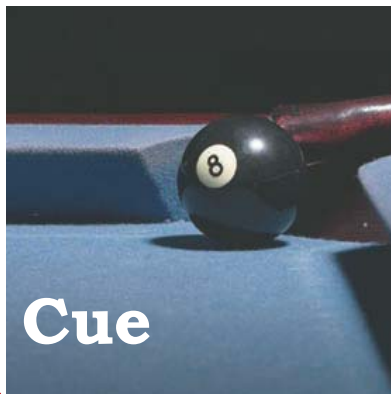

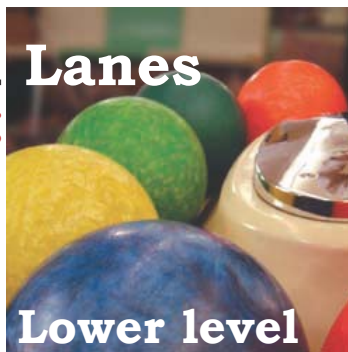

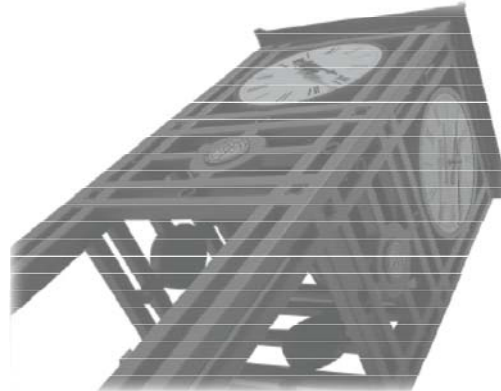

Our Brother Mike Fossum's Recent Trip to Space

Mike Fossum was looking forward to attending *NOAC* this year, but his latest high-adventure trip was delayed and kept him from joining us.

He recently returned from a trip to the International Space Station that lasted 306 hours, 37 minutes and 54 seconds. During this mission, Mike, along with Piers Sellers, tested new equipment and procedures that increase the safety of space shuttles, and produced never-before-seen, high-resolution images of the shuttle during and after its July 4 launch.

In a letter he wrote to the participants of *NOAC 2006*, Mike said:

"You will find in the years ahead that the teamwork and leadership skills you learn in Scouting are some of the most valuable assets you own."

We are proud to call Astronaut Mike Fossum our Brother.

On his most recent mission, Mike was part of the crew that performed maintenance on the space station and tested the 50-foot robotic arm boom extension as a work platform. They removed and replaced a cable that provides power, command and data and

video connections to the station's mobile transporter rail car. They also tested techniques for inspecting and repairing the reinforced carbon-carbon segments that protect the shuttle's nose cone and leading edge of the wings.

Mike was born December 19, 1957, in South Dakota, and grew up in Texas. He married the former Melanie J. London. They now have 4 children. He enjoys family activities, jogging, fishing, and backpacking. His mother, Patricia A. Fossum, resides in McAllen, Texas, while his father, Merlyn E. Fossum, is deceased.

Mike graduated from McAllen High School in McAllen, Texas, in 1976. He then graduated from Texas A&M University for mechanical engineering in 1980. Soon after, he completed systems engineering courses at the Air Force Institute of Technology in 1981. In 1997, he completed his education at the University of Houston-Clear Lake (M.S., physical science; space science).

Bus Shuttle Schedule

For shuttle bus departure to Detroit Airport on Thursday, August 3rd, look for information in *The Daily Legend*. Lodges should review this information, confirm flights, and advise the transportation group of the Administrative Services Committee with any changes as soon as possible. Over 1,200 Arrowmen need transport to the airport in a timely manner, so advance notice of changes are greatly appreciated!

Staff and lodges MUST depart on the assigned buses at the ASSIGNED TIMES. There are no provisions for Arrowmen to leave on an earlier or later bus. There will be a representative with a check-in list at each loading site. Only people assigned to that bus will be allowed to board. YOU MUST BE ON TIME! Unfortunately, the buses will not be able to wait for late arrivals. We will be using contingent flight departure information to calculate the campus departure time. Please expect to load onto a bus a minimum of FOUR hours before your flight time.

Loading points are established as follows: the CATA Bus Stop is first,

located in front of the Brody Complex on Harrison Avenue. It will then proceed to the Wilson Road CATA Bus Stop, located in front of the Wilson complex. All buses will make these 2 stops only and then proceed directly to the airport. Specific points of pick up are located on the existing CATA bus shuttle route. The bus will stop and load at each location for only 10 minutes.

World Scout Jamboree 2007

On July 27, 2007, Scouts and Scouters from around the world will assemble at Hyland Park in Chelmsford, Essex, UK, to kick off the 21st World Jamboree. Over 40,000 participants representing over 150 countries will unite to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Scouting. Participants will have opportunities during the Jamboree to meet interesting people from all corners of the earth. This is one of only a handful of events a person can attend (besides the Olympics) to be in a single place with so many different nations represented.

While attending the Jamboree, Scouts will participate in patrol activities. They will also take part in three days of off-site activity, including Gilwell Park, where the first Wood Badge course was held, a sailing experience, and a day of service. The day of service will focus on the various parks and communities around the area.

August 1, 2007, is the 100th anniversary of Scouting. There will be a day long

celebration open only to participants; no visitors will be permitted to attend. It will begin with a sunrise show at 6:00 a.m. to kick off the festivities. During the day, there will be tons of fun games and many programs to commemorate the history of Scouting. There will be a huge party that evening, with dancing and an interactive show.

The World Jamboree is a once in a lifetime experience that every Scout should consider attending. The cost is \$3975 for participants up to the age of 18. Adults 18-20 are welcome to register as 3rd Assistant Scoutmasters for a contingent, while everyone else 18 and over can serve on staff or as a member of the International Service Team (IST). The cost for IST members 18-24 is \$1750, while IST age 25 and over costs \$1950.
