Each December, section chiefs from across the country gather at the Order of the Arrow's National Planning Meeting in Dallas, Texas for two reasons: to plan the next year's program of emphasis and to elect the next national OA officers.

This past December, Sean Murray was elected to serve as the national chief and Chris Schildknecht was elected to the position of national vice chief. These two young men represent our organization at a national level at both Order of the Arrow and general BSA events.

Sean Murray of Norwich, New York, is a Vigil Honor member of Otahnagon Lodge of the Baden-Powell Council. Sean is an accounting major at Syracuse University in Syracuse, N.Y., and hopes to matriculate to law school after graduating. While serving as the 2006 National OA Chief, he has traveled to many incredible places. This past March, he traveled to Washington, D.C.,

and had the honor of meeting President George W. Bush in the Oval Office to present the BSA's Annual Report to the Nation.

All national officers must serve as section chief prior to being elected. Prior to section chief, Sean has served as section vice chief, two terms as lodge chief and one term as chapter chief. In 2002, he attended his first NOAC and in 2003 attended Indian Summer. At the last NOAC in 2004, Sean was on both the communications staff as well as the ICE staff.

When asked what he most looks forward to about NOAC, Sean responded by saying, "The fun and enthusiasm that each NOAC brings is something very special. As I look forward to our national conference, I am excited to have the opportunity to meet talented youth and adult Arrowmen from across the nation."

Christopher Schildknecht of Cincinnati, Ohio, is from Ku-Ni-Eh Lodge of

the Dan Beard Council and was elected as the 2006 National OA Vice Chief. Prior to serving as national vice chief, he served Section C-4B as its chief.

Chris is studying veterinary medicine at Ohio State University in Columbus, Ohio, and aspires to become a veterinarian.

Chris is a Vigil Honor member, Founder's Award recipient and an Eagle Scout.

This summer, Chris participated in the OA Wilderness Voyage at Northern Tier National High Adventure Base and had an amazing time. In 2004, he was able to attend the Danish National Jamboree in Denmark and hopes to return to Denmark next summer. Chris also has served as lodge treasurer, lodge vice chief and lodge chief.

While at NOAC this week, Chris looks forward to meeting other Arrowmen from across the country and from around the world.

## OA is recognized by the City of East Lansing and the State of Michigan

For the first time in the Order's history, the City of East Lansing, Michigan and Michigan State University is playing host to the National Order of the Arrow Conference. MSU prides itself as a major US public university with a global reach. Arrowmen attending NOAC will utilize only a portion of the 5200 acre campus, which is located three miles east of the state capitol in Lansing.

The City Council of East Lansing passed a special resolution on July 18th, 2006 recognizing July 29 to August 3,

2006 as "Order of the Arrow days." The resolution reads in part, "... we urge all citizens to become involved in community service projects and abide by the Order of the Arrow motto, Brotherhood of Cheerful Service, during this time."

The resolution also notes that OA volunteers will complete roughly 10,000 hours of volunteer service to the campus and the surrounding area. The OA thanks the City Council of the East Lansing and Mayor Samir Singh for this

resolution.

Additionally, the State of Michigan passed a special tribute in honor of NOAC on July 29th, 2006. Signed by State Senator Gretchen Whitmer of the 23rd District and Governor Jennifer M. Granholm, the plaque reads, "Let it be known that it is both an honor and a privilege to extend the sincerest praise and commendation to the National Order of the Arrow organization in acknowledgement of their Order of the Arrow Conference." The OA ap-

preciates this recognition by the State of Michigan.

The web site for the City of East Lansing notes the importance of the relationship between the city and MSU. MSU is a vital ingredient in what makes East Lansing "such an appealing place to live and MSU students fill the streets with energy, enthusiasm and personality."

However, the streets of East Lansing may not be able to contain the energy and enthusiasm that is NOAC!



# Where do I get NOAC gear?

There are three official NOAC Trading Posts where you can conveniently get your NOAC essentials. Here is what you need to know:

There will be several portable climbing walls with climbs of varying levels of difficulty as well as an experienced staff that will walk you through the proper safety measures.

The climbing area is located next to the SCUBA pool between Armstrong & Bailey Halls in the Brody Complex in the northwest corner of campus. Open climbing will operate at various times during the conference. On Sunday, the facilities will be open from 1:30 - 3:30 p.m.; on Monday and Tuesday, from 1:30 - 5 p.m.; and on Wednesday, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

All of the necessary equipment will be provided for a fun and safe experience. All you need to bring is yourself, a sense of adventure, and some energy. Afraid of heights? Even if you don't make it to the top, trying is one step closer to overcoming your apprehensions.

Extreme High Adventure (XHA) Climbing will also offer an Intro to Rock Climbing from 9 a.m. - noon on Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday for those who pre-registered for this class. These individuals will be instructed on the basics of climbing, including knots, safety, and technique.

XHA Climbing at NOAC 2006 is sure to be a great time for everyone who attempts a climb or for those taking a class, so plan time in your schedule to come visit the walls!

## See what all the buzz is about at SCUBA

Are you feeling adventurous? Do you want to explore new frontiers of our planet? SCUBA diving allows you to see places that most people can only dream about. Come and see what the buzz is about and try SCUBA!

During the afternoon activity period after lunch, youth can come to the outdoor pool and actually use SCUBA equipment underwater! No experience is necessary and you can try it as many times as you would like. Meet Divemasters from the OA Ocean Adventure program

from the Florida Sea Base and see what the OA is doing while diving! Try it out, we guarantee you will have a great time.

Get there early, as this is a popular activity. Bring your swim trunks and a copy of your hold harmless form (contact your contingent leader) to the outdoor pool at Hearty Field. You must have a copy of the hold harmless agreement with you to participate! Changing facilities are available at the pool. See you there.



# NOAC Security: keeping us safe

The NOAC Security Staff welcomes you to the conference! We hope that you have a safe and pleasant visit in East Lansing. We ask that you review and abide by the 2006 National Order of the Arrow Conference Code of Conduct during your stay.

NOAC Security is located in Case Hall, room 343. Here are some important security office phone numbers:

- General Information: dial ext. 21695 using Campus phones, or (517) 432-1695

Security Staff members are easy to recognize in their bright orange caps and tan shirts, if you require assistance.

Enjoy the conference, but please remain alert. Always lock your room door and never leave belongings unattended. Remember, YOU are responsible for YOUR valuables.

We suggest that you lock your room, even if you'll be back "in just a minute," or if you're "just visiting a friend in the next room."

Severe Weather Warning System: in event of weather emergency, a steady wail siren may sound. If you hear this alarm, seek shelter immediately. All campus buildings have designated shelter areas.

Guidelines for conference shows:

1. No video cameras, however flash cameras are ok.
2. Entrance to the show will re-

quire a Conference ID Card.

3. No food or drinks are allowed in the Breslin Center.

4. Please use proper conduct while in the Breslin Center. Laser pointers, silly string, water guns or any other object that may distract others from viewing the show or may prevent the show from being presented are permitted.

5. Due to space, safety and security concerns, NO backpacks, fanny packs, other carried bags, totems, or any large objects are allowed inside the Breslin Center during shows. Unattended items will be removed from the premises.

Lost & Found items are placed with Administrative Services, located in the MSU Union, Iowa Room (3rd Floor). If you have lost an item, swing by and let

them know. Found items may be taken there, or given to any NOAC Security Staff.

There is a no smoking rule that applies to all campus buildings. Smoke alarms in the buildings bring a full response by fire and rescue.

Roller skates, roller blades, and skateboards are permitted only in designated areas!

BSA regulations require that all bike riders, skateboarders and roller bladders wear a helmet while moving about campus.

Campus parking: due to limited parking on campus, please plan on parking your vehicles in dead storage areas 66A, 83, and 89.

The ASK (Arrowmen Sharing Knowledge) area will consist of one horizontal climbing wall, an A-frame climbing wall, and a zig zag wall.

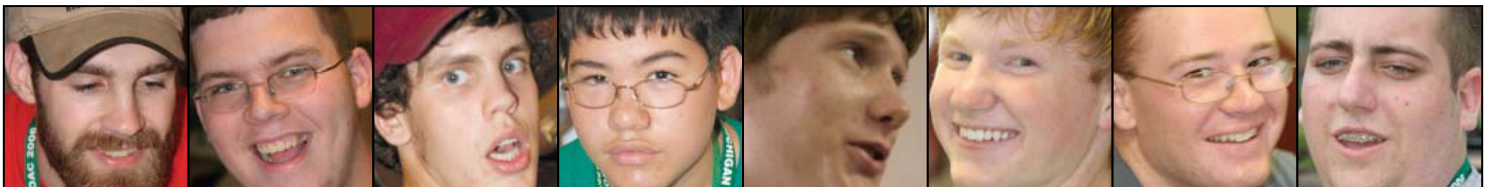

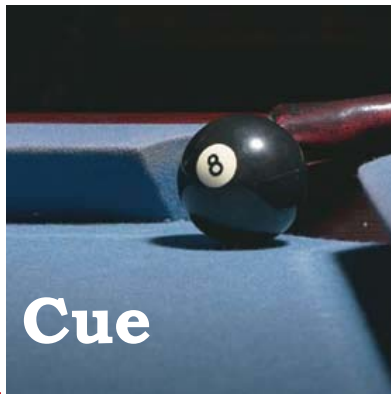

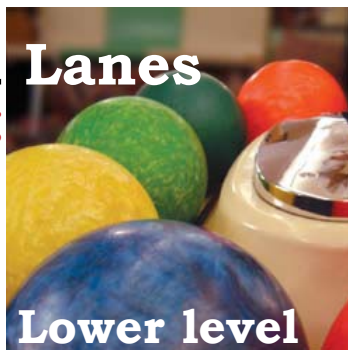

### Follow the rules

In order to reduce confusion during the evening shows located at the Breslin Student Events Center, please remember the following:

- Doors are scheduled to open at 7:30 p.m.
- Conference ID tags are required for entrance to all shows. Arrowmen should assemble at their assigned door before the show.
- Please use the following entrances based on your nametag colors:
  - ◆ Black & White: Gate A
  - ◆ Yellow & Red: Gate B
  - ◆ Blue, Orange & Purple: Gate D
  - ◆ Green: Any gate
- Wheelchair accessibility will be through the Ticketing entrance next to Gate B.
- Please use proper conduct while in the arena. Due to space, safety, and security concerns, the university requires that backpacks, fanny packs, other carried bags, totems, food or drinks, laser pointers, noisemakers, silly string, water guns, large objects, or any other object that may distract others from viewing the show or prevent the show from being presented are not to be allowed in the Breslin Student Events Center. Unattended items will be removed from the premises.
- Although flash cameras are permitted, no video cameras will be allowed.

## Special Access for Scouts with Special Needs

All Scouts and Scouters who need special access because of a disability or an injury need to visit the Special Access Team tent during check in. It is the goal of NOAC 2006 to meet your needs and make this the best NOAC ever.

Available services include: sign language interpreter and show seating

(obtain access pass), wheelchair seating for shows (obtain seating pass), bus transportation with accessible seating, access maps, and housing adjustments available for needs.

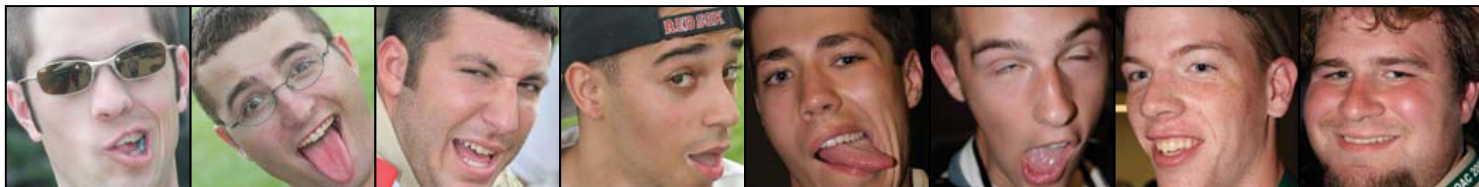

# National Conference Code of Conduct

The general welfare of any group depends on the conduct of each individual member. This ensures the success of our National Order of the Arrow Conference and provides the maximum benefit to every participant. As an Arrowman, I understand this and support the reasonable demands of conduct expected of me.

I understand the lodge contingent leadership is responsible for the supervision of its membership in respect to maintaining discipline and security, and TO ENFORCE the National Conference Code of Conduct.

As a member of the Order of the Arrow, I will:

1. Observe the Scout Oath or Promise, the Scout Law and the Order of the Arrow Obligation.
2. NOAC participants attending

seminars, shows, and training sessions will be expected to be in full Scout uniform. The activity uniform is for use during recreational events only. Participants may wear a NOAC or Scout T-shirt or golf shirt with their Scout shorts or trousers on Founders Day. All participants will be expected to be in full Scout uniform for the Wednesday evening Theme Show.

3. Attend all planned training and general sessions.
4. Confine trading and swapping to free periods and designated areas.
5. Be personally responsible for breakage, damage, or loss of property.
6. Observe quiet hours and lights out from midnight to 7 a.m.
7. Keep my quarters clean and orderly and dispose of trash in proper receptacle.

8. Not change my officially assigned room without permission from conference headquarters. The reason: emergency calls, for example, could not be delivered if room changes were unofficial.

9. Allow no unregistered person to occupy my resident hall room.

10. Wear suitable covering in the resident hall when going down the corridors. I will also wear suitable covering while swimming or participating in any conference program.

11. Observe all rules regarding the use of the swimming pools and other athletic facilities.

12. Understand that the purchase, possession, or consumption of alcoholic beverages or illicit drugs at the conference will not be permitted and will result in immediate dismissal from

the conference. This standard shall apply to all youth and adult participants. Compliance with state law and university regulations will apply at all times.

13. Comply with federal, state and city laws and university regulations, including those which prohibit the use of fireworks, firearms, and gambling. Infraction of these laws and regulations will be cause for immediate dismissal from the conference.

15. Not be authorized to sell items at the conference. I understand that the official trading posts are the only source for purchasing items at the conference.

16. At all times, be the considerate guest of a considerate host university.

17. Follow the Boy Scouts of America's policy on smoking and observe all university NO-SMOKING restrictions.
