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How'd you get here?

There are thousands of Arrowmen at NOAC. These thousands of Arrowmen used hundreds of different routes to get to East Lansing. Here are some of their stories:

Wauna La-Mon'tay Lodge, located in both Washington and Oregon, had one of the most interesting trips. They traveled nearly 3000 miles - their journey began in Portland, OR, then took them to Phoenix, AZ, northeastward to Detroit, and finally to NOAC. During their travel, their bus broke down 3 different times. Each time they stopped, their bus wouldn't restart. They switched to a different bus and while on that new bus they ran into a deer. This accident left an imprint of the deer's head and antlers on the hood of the bus - with blood and fur everywhere!

Esslen Lodge from Santa Cruz, CA had a hard time getting to MSU. They boarded their plane at midnight and sat on the runway for two hours until the crew notified them their flight was canceled. After another two hours of waiting, they boarded a new flight and took off towards Detroit. As this was a hair-raising

experience, they decided that the group would look better in mohawks, so they started to shave each others' heads. The reactions of their mothers to this display of lodge spirit was not known by press time.

Wahunsenakah Lodge from Virginia had a lot of fun on their trip to NOAC. Their first flight went off without a hitch. It was their second flight that made the trip difficult. Their second flight left early - before their first flight had even landed! They were ultimately moved onto a later flight. Once that plane landed

in Detroit, their baggage was locked into a room and they were unable to pick it up. After finally tracking down the head of security to verify their identification, they collected their gear. On the way to Michigan State University and NOAC, the bus broke down on the trip from the airport, so they had to switch to another bus. The guys from Wahunsenakah noted that although the trip was difficult, it wasn't the worst part of their journey; the worst part was landing in Detroit only to find that the Starbucks wasn't open.

Meet artist 'Crazy Horse'

Acclaimed western artist Greg Perillo answers his phone "Crazy Horse" whenever you call. Why you might ask? Because no known photographs of Chief Crazy Horse exist, Perillo uses his own strong facial characteristics, hair and eyes to portray this legendary Native American Chieftain in his artwork! The OA is indeed fortunate to have Perillo as the official artist of NOAC 2006. Perillo has been called the Frederick Remington of the new century.

He created a masterpiece for our Order based upon the NOAC theme "The Legend Lives On." This original painting features Chief Chingachgook and Uncas, painting the Legend on a large skin. In his study to prepare for the creation of "The Legend Lives On," Perillo discovered that there were elements in our original Legend that were not historically accurate, such as teepees and feathered costumes. The magnificent painting is destined to one day hang in the OA collection at the National Museum of the BSA

in Irving, Texas, but here at NOAC, you can view this wonderful work of art in the Main Trading Post.

Moreover, Perillo learned during his research that the original inhabitants of New York City were the Lenni Lenape tribe. He has captured the Lenape, the basis for the OA Legend, in their daily lives in remarkable detail in 37 original oil paintings. Twelve of these paintings will be on display during "Meet the Man" today!

As a young member of the Order, Walter Vines, at the request of his lodge advisor Lee A. Ellison, painted the original Legend on deerskin in 1957. This deerskin was used during ceremonies to assist his lodge in remembering the Legend. For the first time in 50 years, Vines will have his original Legend on display during "Meet the Man" at NOAC! He will be translating the work and answering questions about our Legend and its pictographs. To further enhance the experience, Vines will be replicating his own Legend during NOAC!



Outdoor adventure at TOAP

Be sure to check out the The Outdoor Adventure Place or "TOAP" when you get a chance! The activities available here range from small stove cooking to fly-rod casting. TOAP is split into several different activity areas that include bouldering walls, a disability awareness challenge course, a monkey bridge, a swing, hands on displays of the different types of camping (snow, low impact, canoe, horseback, backpacking, etc.) tomahawk throwing, and much more.

During lunch, the USDA Forest Service will be running a variety of different displays with a focus on Leave No Trace and ArrowCorps5.

ArrowCorps5 is a conservation program set to take place for the summer of 2008 that will involve different wilderness areas around the country. A forest ranger from each area will be there to answer any questions you may have about the program. In the cooking section, you can enjoy the delight of

cooking on a "range" of stoves, from those made of cat food cans to cooking inside of a garbage can. (For more information on camping stoves be sure to visit www.zenstoves.com.) If you stop by, you can help cook SPAM with Hawaiian rice, an assortment of cakes, multiple dehydrated meals, a roasted turkey, three-cheese lasagna, and condiment cooking.

Another area of TOAP is the fly fishing exhibit. Here you can learn the

art of fly fishing. You can even tie a fly of your own to take back home. There is a challenge course where you can try to cast your fly into a series of hoops set at different distances. Scores will be tallied for competition purposes. These are just a few of the great activities that will be taking place at TOAP. Be sure to drop by and partake in the many fun programs that TOAP has to offer.

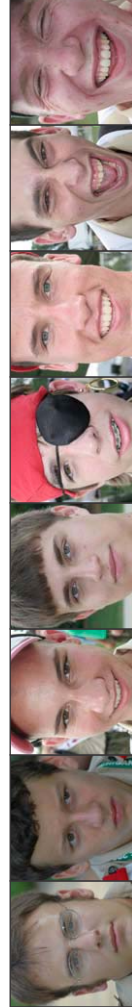
He attends the University of California, Davis and majors in political science. Brian is a fan of the Food Network, especially "30 Minute Meals With Rachel Ray."

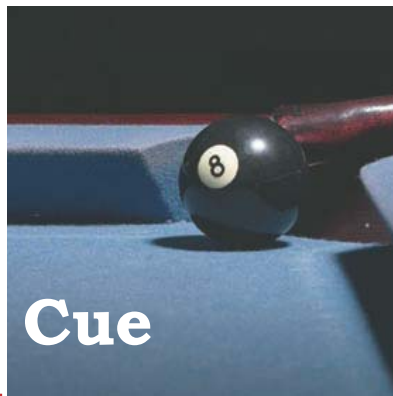

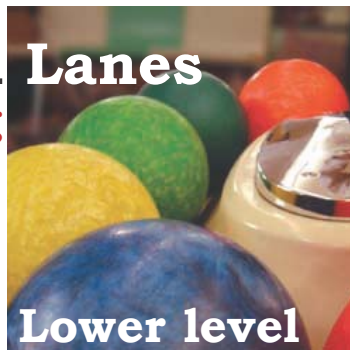
