Haddock Ensures Success

Brad Haddock began his scouting career 43 years ago at the age of eight. He has been an Arrowman for 38 years, serving in capacities ranging from chapter elections chairman to the 1975-76 National Chief.

He went on to serve in an adult capacity, joining the OA National Committee and serving in various roles until becoming our National Chairman.

We began our discussion with the value of the Scouting program and more specifically, the value of the Order of the Arrow. Brad shared a quote from the book "Characteristics of Servant Leadership": "The only ones among you who will be really happy are those who have sought and found how to serve."

It is clear from this discussion that Arrowmen have a lot to look forward to in the years ahead.

This year marks the third cycle of the Lodge Assistance Team program. This program is helping lodges with internal administration and council relations. Another new initiative encourages councils to present an annual report to the council executive board.

These are only small parts of a large plan the Order is putting together to forge better relationships between the lodge and the council.

The Order of the Arrow National Committee is presently working on phase three of their long term strategic plan, designed to mirror the plan that the National Boy Scout Committee has created.

This will ensure that these two committees are working together to accomplish a common purpose. Phase three of the strategic plan will focus on membership retention, along with endorsements and professional Scouting recruitment.

It appears that the Order has been fairly consistent in membership retention over the past few years, even with the recent dues increase.

In 2008, ArrowCorps⁵ is a program to get excited about! The program was Brad's vision, and brought to reality by members of the OA Steering Committee.

The Order of the Arrow has had a long-standing interest in preserving our nation's natural habitats. That interest has transpired into such programs as the OA Wilderness Voyage, OA Trail Crew, and OA Ocean Adventure. At NOAC this week, the National Order of the Arrow Committee is unveiling another program of emphasis, set to launch in the summer of 2008, that will breathe fresh air into preserving our national forests.

In cooperation with the US Forestry Service, the Order of the Arrow's ArrowCorps⁵ program hopes to send five thousand Arrowmen to five different national forests over the course of five

weeks. This plan will give much needed service to the Mark Twain National Forest in Missouri, the Manti-La Sal National Forest in Utah, the George Washington & Jefferson National Forests in Virginia, the Shasta-Trinity National Forest in California, and the Bridger-Teton National Forest in Wyoming.

The first week begins on June 7, 2008 and the fifth week starts on July 26, 2008. Each week will consist of forestry maintenance as well as recreational activities like whitewater rafting, kayaking, fishing, mountain climbing, house boating, and waterskiing.
