Operation Service Spartan Breakout

Roughly one hundred and fifty Arrowmen gathered yesterday at Spartan Stadium to participate in Operation Service: Spartan Breakout. This part of Operation Service focused on an evacuation drill conducted by the MSU Police Department, East Lansing Fire Department, and local emergency management officials. Representatives of the FBI, Homeland Security and Emergency Management Agencies in Illinois and Indiana were also on hand to observe the drill. Arrowmen were asked to stage an evacuation from the fourth floor of the complex in response to a fire or other simulated emergency. Employees working in the stadium participated in the evacuation drill as well.

One important aspect of this drill was the first-ever deployment in the stadium of Evacu-Trac, a new evacuation system designed for people with limited mobility to transfer them from their

wheelchair to an evacuation chair that would allow the person to be evacuated via stairway. Captain Mike Montgomery of the East Lansing Fire Department said that this system has been in service for one year in the surrounding community. The Evacu-Trac places the evacuee in a fully strapped-in and secured seated position. It also features a “dead-man switch” braking system which ensures the safety of the evacuee even if the rescuer stumbles. Mike Avery of Takoda Lodge volunteered to help first responders test this new system. To thank the participants for their valuable service, all Arrowmen involved received an Operation Service patch at the completion of the drill. According to Sergeant Maureen Kennedy of the MSU Police Department, who served as the drill coordinator, Arrowmen participation was vital to assessing how an evacuation of the Spartan Stadium, as well as other stadiums throughout the Midwest, would take place.

On the front nine, Brando Guzik receive an award for being closest to the pin, Mark Ewing received an award for the longest putt, and Josh May received an award for the longest drive.

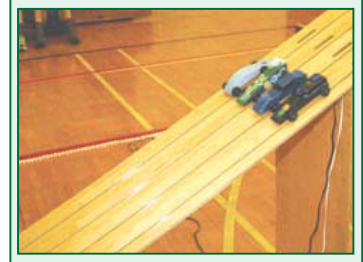

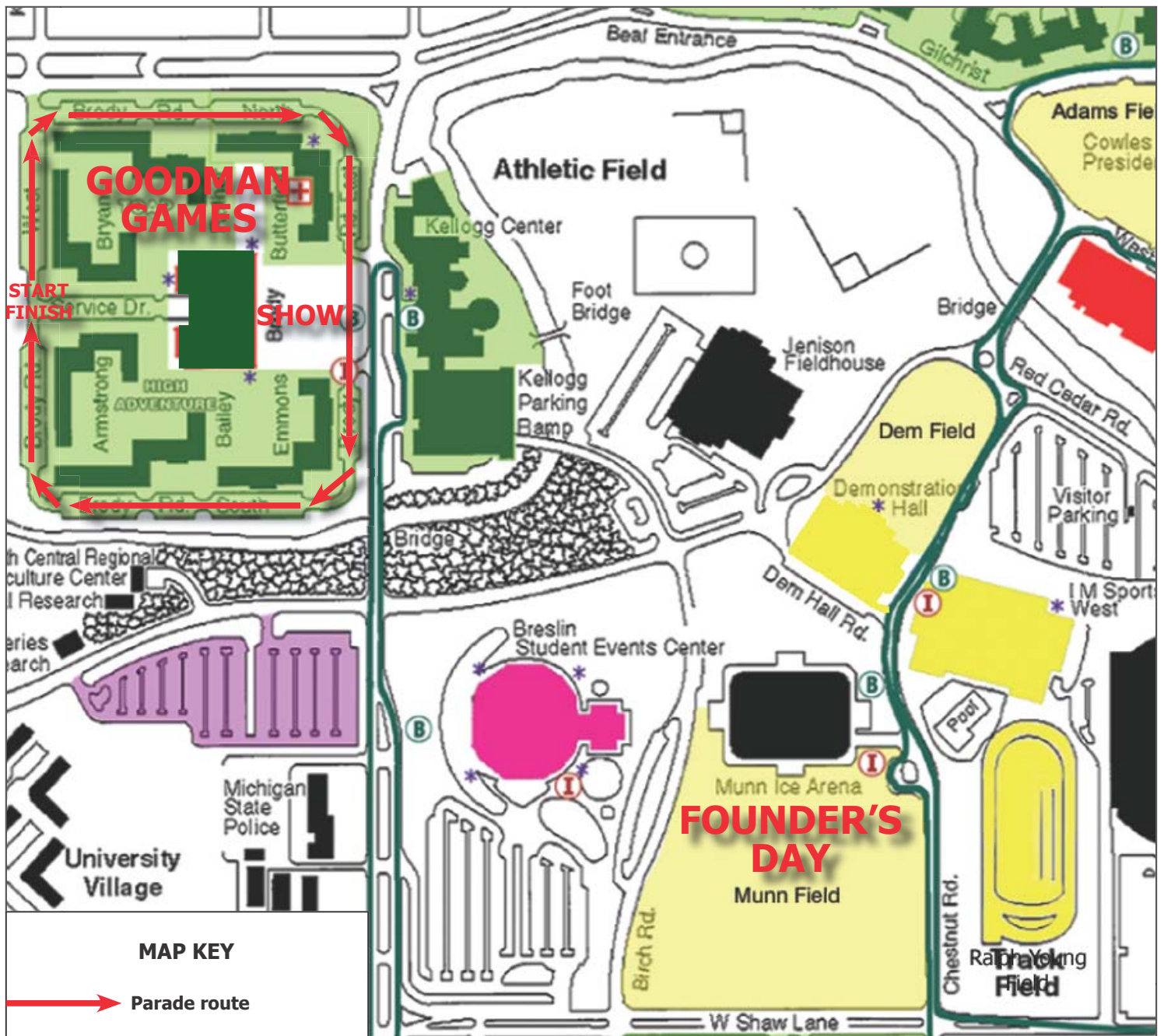
All individual accomplishments each received a \$25 gift card.

Flying Home From NOAC?

Follow these directions to ensure you make it to the airport

After five days at MSU, it will be time for all of us to head home in the morning.

Those of you not flying out of Detroit Metro Wayne Airport are on your own.

Staff members and contingents that signed up to use the NOAC Bus Shuttle to DTW may verify reservations on the attached schedule.

The list is arranged by departure time from campus. Buses leave campus at least four hours before a flight's scheduled departure time.

There are no provisions for Arrowmen to leave on an earlier or later bus. Each Arrowman is responsible for arriving at the bus stop on his or her own with bags in hand.

A representative of the Transportation Committee will be loading passengers at each check-in site for 10 minutes with a listing of those scheduled to ride the bus.

Buses will not be able to wait for late arrivals. Set your alarm clock accordingly.

Buses will load only at existing CATA Bus Stops in the following locations:

- In front of the Brody Complex on Harrison Avenue;
- In front of the Wilson Complex on Wilson Road;
- In front of the Yakeley Dorm on West Circle Drive.

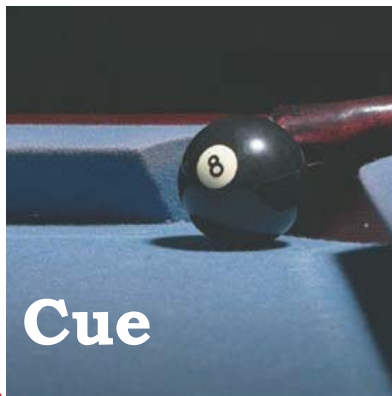

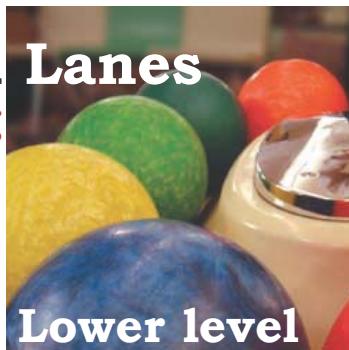
