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National recognition The Outdoor Adventure Place


In 1940, the Distinguished Service Award was created to honor those who render service to the Order of the Arrow beyond the lodge level. The award is presented to those Arrowmen who have rendered distinguished and outstanding service to the Order on a sectional, area, regional, or national basis. It is given primarily for dedicated service to the Order and Scouting over a period of years.

The first awards were presented at Camp Twin Echo in Pennsylvania, to Dr. E. Urner Goodman, Col. Carroll A. Edson and eight others at the 1940 National Meeting. Between 1940 and the first national conference in 1948, the award was presented at national meetings as deserving individuals were found.

Thereafter, the award presentation became a traditional part of the pageantry and ceremony of the national conferences. Since the time of the first awards in 1940, fewer than 1,000 Distinguished Service Awards have been presented. This alone is a testament to its high standard of excellence.

The award is a sterling silver arrowhead, bearing an arrow pointing up-

ward and to the wearer's right, suspended from a white neck ribbon upon which are embroidered red arrows. A white square knot embroidered upon red cloth is available for uniform wear.



Presentation of the award is limited. Arrowmen whose service records are the most outstanding beyond the local lodge are usually selected. Nominations are open to both youth and adult Arrowmen.

Another national recognition is the Red Arrow Award — presented by the National Order of the Arrow committee for distinguished service to the Order by either non-scouters or scouters who are not members of the Order. This service may take many forms and should involve a significant period of time, as opposed to single event. A limited number of awards are presented to those whose accomplishments are of the highest order.




The Outdoor Adventure Place






Founders Day awesomeness now with 7,000 kazoos

Three worthy women presented Red Arrow Award

Created in 1967, the Red Arrow award is used by the National Order of the Arrow Committee to honor worthy persons who have made contributions to the Order although they are not part of the Order themselves. This year, three women will receive Red Arrow awards.

From Ponca City, Oklahoma is Rosetta LeClair. LeClair has been involved in many different Scouting activities throughout her lifetime, earning her the nickname 'Grandma LeClair'. She has played an active role in Inola Lodge 148 since the 1970's, specializing in Native American culture. LeClair shared her Native American knowledge, helping to strengthen the lodge. Eventually, she even spread her wealth of knowledge

beyond her own region, assisting Colloneh Lodge 137 at their Native American events and conclaves. Rosetta LeClair's culture has played a huge role in her life, and she has touched many lives through Scouting sharing this history.

Sandra Reti, of Parlin, NJ, has been involved in the Northeast Region for more than 10 years as its program secretary. She has also assisted with the Woodbadge program and has provided support for many different section and region events. According to Doug Fullman, associate Northeast region director for program, Reti's dedication to her job and to youth help to ensure programs in the region succeed. He says that Reti is "very important to the success of the region".

The final 2009 recipient of the Red Arrow award is Patricia Swedenburg of

Dallas, GA. Wife of Southern Region Staff Advisor Keith Swedenburg, Patricia has served Scouting since 1979 where she began as a Den Leader for Pack 17 in Reform, AL. Over the years, she has continued to play an active role in Scouting, serving as a leader in several troops including Indian Waters Council Troop 339, where she is an Assistant Scoutmaster. She has also helped at many National Camping Schools, NLS', NLATS', and SOS's, in addition to participating in three ArrowCorps⁵ sites in summer 2008. It is clear that Swedenburg has played a very active role in Scouting, helping in many different and distinct areas.

All three of these women are very deserving of the Red Arrow award. They received their awards at last night's show.



**DUSTIN J. COUNTS**



**DARRELL DONAHUE**



**TYLER ELLIOT**



**BRUCE MAYFIELD**



**MICHAEL S. KIRBY**



**ANDREW KUHLMANN**





**KAYLENE TRICK**



**CHRISTOPHER SCHILDKNECHT**



Payment is required at metered parking, including handicap metered parking.


NOAC re:MIX


